

Urgent Action Alert

The Nebraska School Activities Association's Board of Directors has adopted a policy that allows students, under certain circumstances, to participate in sports activities according to their gender preference. This policy is detrimental to those students who experience gender dysphoria, violates the rights of other students, creates confusion among young people concerning sexual identity, and establishes a dangerous public policy precedent in the State of Nebraska. The policy is contrary to Catholic teaching about the human person and therefore also could jeopardize the religious liberty of our Catholic NSAA member schools and conscience rights of public school officials.

On April 8, the NSAA Representative Assembly will be voting on a proposal to restore the prior NSAA practice that students participate according to the sex noted on their certificate of birth. It is imperative that all concerned parents and other citizens contact their local school board members and public high school superintendents to urge them to lobby their delegates to the Representative Assembly to vote for the "sex at birth" proposal. Please contact these officials with the message: I am writing (or calling) about the NSAA Representative Assembly to be held on April 8. Please contact the Assembly delegates for our NSAA district and urge them to vote in favor of the proposal that a student's gender is determined by the sex noted on his/her certificate at birth.

Parish Health Notes Eating Disorder Awareness

If someone is exhibiting signs or thoughts of struggling with an eating disorder, intervening during the early stages of development can significantly increase the likelihood of preventing the onset of a full-blown eating disorder. It also leads to greater chances of a full recovery and can prevent years of struggle. Bottom line: early intervention can save lives.

National Eating Disorders Association provides an online eating disorder screening tool at www.nedawareness.org. This website provides people with the option to take a free, anonymous self-assessment to gauge their risk of an eating disorder. The anonymous online screening takes only a few minutes and consists of a series of questions, developed by treatment professionals in the eating disorders field, which are designed to indicate whether clinical help is needed. This is an outstanding resource for people who may need help or know someone who is struggling with signs and symptoms of an eating disorder.

Pro Life Follow the Money
